 - R Janyk called the meeting to order at 4:02 pm

2. **Adoption of the Agenda**

4. **Business Carried Forward**
 - 4.1 **Curriculum recommended by the CPRC – BUS and Continuing Studies**

New Program – Hospitality Service Training Certificate
Motion: N deMelo/S Rossouw
"That Education Council approves the new program revision: Hospitality Service Training Certificate as recommended by the CPRC – BUS."
 - V Simpson thanked the committee for the feedback and suggestions. The new program description includes removal of Grade 12 as an admission requirement and updated English requirements. FoodSafe is no longer required prior to admission and the certification is valid five years.
 - V Simpson introduced A Schuppener from the Cove Lakeside Resort.
 - A Schuppener advised she was fortunate to be involved at ground level of development for this program. She was able to contribute based on her experience and expertise in the industry. One of the biggest advantages to the program is that it provides students with experience that is more realistic view of what is expected in the work world. These skills are the first skills that can be put in place to work in the hospitality environment. She added that they often receive applications from students with other diplomas and while

they have a post-secondary education, in most cases that education doesn't provide the skill set this program provides. She expects they would be willing to hire students from a program like this. She acknowledged the hospitality industry has high turnover rates due to seasonal nature of work.

- A member expressed respect for the new proposal adding she still has one big concern which is regarding success of the certificate and what would success of the certificate look like. She added that it appears employers would prefer employees with the certificate. The concern is that UT students are not competing on same level as students with a certificate and feels they would be adding to an already problematic job market. A Schuppener acknowledged she can see where people are coming from adding the industry tends to struggle to have an adequate number of applicants or candidates and not having enough candidates has led to seeking people from out of the country. Students with training and skills will likely stay instead of moving on so quickly. This certificate will help those in industry to know they are creating a workforce with the skills they want to work in this industry. Still thinks there will be enough jobs for both. This helps to show which people want to stay in this industry.
- A member advised there are already not enough people, so now why add this as a requirement. The member expressed annoyance at needing a certificate to be a chambermaid which is a minimum wage job adding that industry needs to address the wage issue first. A Schuppener advised we are not just talking about minimum wage jobs, noting this certificate will not be a requirement, but an asset. She added it is hard to find enough people to hire and this indicates that people have taken the time and shown interest in the industry. The industry is seasonal to a degree. When you have a person that invests in the skills to assist them, a diploma does not always help as they don't have the basic knowledge which is provided in the certificate.
- A student member expressed personal concerns about the quality of this program and whether or not the program meets the institutions core values.
- D Silvestrone indicated he is a little confused and uneasy about this discussion. In terms of rationale for the program, tourism has been identified as important sector in the region and as far as CS, we support industry partners and part of that includes training a workforce. He added that the needs and interest of tourists visiting the area need to be met. Part of CS is to help ensure the needs of industry partners are met and we have developed a program in partnership with industry partners where the intent is to help those who take the program advance within the industry.
- A member added that when she was in high school, she would have loved a program like this as which would have provided training in this field.
- A member asked if any other colleges offer a similar certificate. V Simpson confirmed she is not certain adding that our program uses the emerit text and students will write an exam to receive a certificate which allows them to work internationally.
- J Muskens advised she was looking online for similar programs and found one that offers pathways to other programs. V Simpson added that Business department doesn't offer anything like this and this certificate will get people in the door and give them a taste of the industry. Students with this certificate and the appropriate prerequisites can enrol in any the Business or any other program. One thing about this program is the customer service component which has been identified as a need by industry.
- A member added support for the program as it appears as it will give students a leg up and it is similar to other CS certificate programs such as the Floral Design certificate.
- A member has issue with 40 hours of unpaid work in the practicum. She added there is a backlash about unpaid work and 40 hours can take up to

two weeks. When 40 hours of unpaid work is required to get this certificate, the backlash is not only from students but also from parents. The member read from an article about unpaid work. The member thinks that as a college we should be looking at value to the institution and to the community and asking people to do unpaid work is adding to a problem.

- D Silvestrone advised we already offer several programs with an unpaid practicum. The purpose of the practicum is that it is offered as an opportunity for people to learn more about the industry.
- A member advised he finds it unfortunate that the practicum is unpaid adding that in some cases the practicum can be a valuable experience and suggested perhaps a co-op option is the way to go. The co-op work term is not costing any more than for any other employee.
- R Janyk pointed out that the co-op work term comes with a cost.
- A member added that as an advisor, she is aware that students appreciate the work experience.
- A member noted that with a practicum, it helps students choose a suitable site for the work placement and ensures that standards are met.
- V Simpson confirmed the department will be communicating with various industries to ensure all placements are suitable. There will be a practicum supervisor that will be in touch with students during practicum. The supervisor will be an OC employee

5. New Business

5.1 Curriculum recommended by the CPRC – TA

a. Program revision – Carpentry and Joinery Foundation

Motion: A Pope/D Marques

"That Education Council approves the program revision: Carpentry and Joinery Foundation as recommended by the CPRC – TA."

- S Moores advised there are three programs to be reviewed and the revisions are similar. He added the intent is to align the program with the ITA requirements and curriculum. With the revisions, the wording and outline more closely reflects the outlines from the ITA.
- The program name will change to ***Carpenter and Joiner Foundation***.
- M Rode advised that the Carpentry & Joinery program is currently on a block system and there have been instances where a student had gone through the program and failed one component and therefore fail the program. Some program components are only worth a very small percentage of time, while others take a great amount of time and all were weighted equally. The ITA did this on a weighted factor by the amount of time each section takes.
- Students who complete this program are granted hours towards their apprenticeship.

b. Program revision – Residential Construction

"That Education Council approves the program revision: Residential Construction as recommended by the CPRC – TA."

- S Moores advised the revision includes a program name change to ***Carpenter Foundation***.
- The current program name is well known to us and in the Valley as we have offered this program for many years. We know what the program is and what it looks like and for outsiders, the proposed name change will clarify exactly what program is.

- M Rode added this was a tough one for a name change and it was done to help clarify the difference between this program and the Carpentry and Joiner Foundation programs.
- S Moores noted the clarification helps to more clearly align things with the ITA.

- M Rode advised that the Studio Woodworking Program is unique to OC with classes filling up as the program is becoming better known.
- The revision is to the marking system. He added that students will receive credit towards first year joinery upon completion of this program.

d. New course – TTTE 119 Learning for Success

Motion: R Tyner/D Marques

“That Education Council approves the new course: TTTE 119 Learning for Success as recommended by the CPRC – TA.”

- Handouts providing the program outline were distributed at the table. S Moores provided some background on the program and reasons for the revision. The TTTE program has been delivered at OC since 2005 and there is another program offered at BCIT. TRU developed a program and it is not known if this program has ever been delivered. The bulk of students that entered the previous OC program had journeyman status in either a trade of technology and had a wealth of practical experience. BCIT started their program with two full cohorts and now offer one cohort. The old diploma had allowed students to go to UBCO to complete the undergraduate degree. Feedback from students was that there was a disconnect from what was delivered by trades and a disconnect from what was delivered by Technologies. The content in the program was also at too high a level to what they would deliver in either the middle or secondary school levels.
- A Tier 3 review was conducted in 2012 and enrolments were decreasing which reinforced what students were feeling. The program was suspended pending a review. The rationale was the program needed to stand out to be successful. A steering committee was formed that included people from OC, the school district, and UBC. With this program, there are jobs out there for grads to step into. While the program review was underway, the UBCO Faculty of Education had a review of their own and determined that anyone entering their program needed a degree to enrol in the Education program. OC needed to consider a different model which includes an undergraduate degree. For the degree part of program, students will be enrolled concurrently in an Adult Bed program at Brock University. At the end of two years, students should be able to complete the Brock degree and transfer to UBCO to complete the Bachelor of Education degree. Some people entering the program will be students leaving high school and others may include people already teaching in the secondary school system, wanting to change career paths. The program offers different options for students. Students could complete two years with OC and the Brock courses within the program or could exit with an OC certificate. Another option is that students complete two years with a diploma, or the Brock degree and/or the UBCO Education degree. Possible to have a certificate, and two degrees.
- A member expressed support for the program and the format proposed. He suggested the calendar description needs work as it is not clear how many

credits are granted towards the B Ed degree. He indicated the program description is not clear and this may be confusing for students. The member added that the differences among teaching certificates across Canada are significant.

- M McCready advised that UBCO was very specific on the wording regarding the degree or equivalent. The teaching board and UBCO have some differences and the teaching credits earned there direct students to teaching adolescents and not at the elementary level.
- A member asked if we have checked with the BC College of Teachers regarding the certifications. M McCready advised they are working with UBCO on this matter.
- A member noted that a number of years ago while at UBC she was teaching BCIT students and questioned if anyone knows how this process worked. S Moores advised he is not certain as BCIT is still a diploma program and not familiar with how it is handled.
- A member asked the TTTE as a stand-alone program will be accepted. S Moores and M McCready confirmed that students require an undergraduate degree to enter the Bachelor of Education program at UBCO. This program (OC and Brock) helps students meet the admission requirements to enter the UBCO B Ed program.
- S Moores clarified students in this program must be able to safely operate equipment in shops and must be able to demonstrate this to students. There is a hands on component offered face-to-face which students are required to take.
- A member asked if the courses completed here are transferable. Y Moritz advised that some courses will receive transfer credit but not all courses.
- A member confirmed that the students are not able to teach after completing the diploma.
- A member asked if the English courses are offered online or DE. M McCready advised they are hoping the courses will be offered online. –
- A member noted that some institutions advertise courses but don't offer them and requested clarification that we have confirmation from Brock that the required courses will be offered. S Moores advised that we have been in consultation with Brock and the OC courses mesh with Brock courses.
- B Dietz added she has been involved in a number of discussions with Brock and OC will be advised and included in discussion if any changes are required. She confirmed that the Brock courses are offered in an online format.
- R Janyk brought members back to the motion for TTTE 119 course.
- A member asked for confirmation that existing teachers entering the program will not have to take this course. S Moores confirmed that some PLA will be granted. How much PLA and what the PLA will be is yet to be determined.

Business and Commercial Aviation Programs

Reference: Block A: Occupational Skills; Block B: Stocks, Soups and Sauces; Block C: Fruits and Vegetables; Block D: Starches; Block E: Meats; Block F: Poultry; Block G: Seafood; Block H: Garde Manger; Block J: Baked Goods and Desserts.

Prerequisites: Completion of PC 1 or equivalent.

Culinary Arts Certificate

Rationale:

The current iteration of the Culinary Arts Certificate has both PC1 and PC2 students in the same courses, it also does not allow for students to acquire 400 external industry workplace hours between PC1 and PC2. This new delivery model provides a co-op between PC1 and PC2 which equates to the required 400 external hours, it also separates PC1 and PC2 curriculum along with increasing instructional content for CA101 and CA 205. Changes are being made to the Culinary Arts Certificate to better reflect student learning and to improve completion rates.

Calendar description:

The Culinary Arts Certificate is for students with a passion for a career in the Restaurant, Food Service and Hospitality Industry and its wide variety of options. This 50 week (1500 hour) program provides the fundamental knowledge needed for successful employment as a cook in one of the many areas of food service. This is an experiential program with emphasis on food preparation and presentation as well as basic service techniques. Located at the Kelowna campus kitchens and Infusions Restaurant, the program mirrors a realistic training environment within the expected industry time-frame.

Apprenticeship technical training credit for Professional Cook Level 1 and Level 2 and 600 work-based hours for Level 1 and 240 work based hours for Level 2 will be granted by the Industry Training Authority (ITA) upon successful completion of this program. Students will receive credit for Foodsafe Level 1. Apprenticeship practical training credit will also be granted by the Industry Training Authority as a result of prior practical experience.

Students must provide proof of completion of the co-op or other 400 work based hours and successfully complete all Level 1 components prior to advancing to Level 2 components of the program. Upon successful completion of Level 1 and Level 2 requirements, students are eligible to challenge the Provincial Cook Certificate of Qualification examinations for Level 1 and Level 2.

Students wishing to pursue the Professional Cook Red Seal endorsement must provide proof of a total of 5,000 work-based hours and complete Level 3 technical training.

Culinary Arts Diploma

Revisions:

- Program outline

Rationale:

The changes to the Culinary Arts portion of this program will increase student learning and improve completion rates. The changes include the separation of PC1 and PC2, a Co-op term between PC1 and PC2, a new lab course at the PC2 level and an increase in hours for CA101 and CA205.

Calendar description:

The Culinary Management Diploma examines the developing Okanagan region trend toward the combination of wineries and restaurants. Unique features of the program include the analysis of food and wine pairing and the combination of food, wine and business training that reflects regional industry training demands.

The total length of the program is two years, beginning with the Culinary Arts program, which includes a ten week co-op, followed by two semesters of Business Administration and Wine courses. Students graduating with this diploma will receive technical training credits towards their cook apprenticeship, hours credited towards their apprenticeship and academic credit for the Business Administration courses completed.

An apprenticeship technical training credit for Professional Cook Level 1 and Level 2 and 600 work-based hours for Level 1 and 240 work-based hours for Level 2 will be granted by the Industry Training Authority (ITA) upon successful completion of this program. Students will also receive credit for FOODSAFE Level 1 and WHMIS (Workplace Hazardous Material Information System). Apprenticeship practical Training credit may also be granted as a result of prior practical experience.

The students must provide proof of completion of an additional 400 work-based hours* and successfully complete all program components prior to advancing to the Level 2 components of the program. The ITA required 400 hours may be obtained with the paid work-based Co-op (week 31 start), depending on the successful completion of the PC1 component. Upon successful completion of the Level 1 and Level 2 requirements students are eligible to challenge the respective Provincial Cook Certificate of Qualification examinations.

Students wishing to pursue the Professional Cook Red Seal endorsement must provide proof of a total of 5,000 work-based hours and complete Level 3 technical training.

*Work-based hours must be under the direct supervision of qualified Tradespersons (Red Seal or equivalent).
