S. Sookochoff noted that Adult Upgrading was approached to review the Water Engineering program regarding filling skills gaps in math courses. Although students were meeting admission requirements, there is difficulty in demonstrating math skills highlighting a gap in the program.

The Registrar asked why math prerequisites are included when students are already admitted to the program. S. Sookochoff noted that if the admission requirements for the program are reviewed, there may be an impact on the course. After further discussion, it was decided that admission to the Water Engineering Technology Diploma is sufficient as a prerequisite.

A member inquired whether there is an initial assessment as part of the course or if students select which course they want to take. S. Sookochoff noted that currently, students are allowed to choose their courses.

### Background Statement:

The Procedures for Education Council Chair and Vice Chair Elections were developed as a supporting document in the Education Council governance review. The purpose of the new document is to establish and document clear and consistent procedures for the election of the Chair and Vice Chair positions on the Okanagan College Education Council. As the election process is conducted by the Registrar under the Bylaws, the procedures were developed by the Registrar in consultation with the Council Secretary and Education Council Chair.

The Procedures outline the nomination and election processes for Chair and Vice Chair elections, and are consistent with best practice and the new Education Council Bylaws approved at the January 9, 2025 Education Council meeting.

### Recommendation:

Given that the Procedures follow previous practices for elections, it is recommended that Education Council review and approves the proposed Procedures for Education Council Chair and Vice Chair Elections and adopt them for the 2025 election cycle.

### Rationale:

Although not formally documented the proposed election procedures are consistent with previous practices used for Chair and Vice Chair elections. The Procedures for Education Council and Vice Chair Elections provide a transparent, efficient, and fair process for Council Chair and Vice Chair elections.

## Procedures for Education Council Chair and Vice Chair Elections

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### 1. Purpose

These procedures set out the process by which the elections for the Chair and Vice Chair positions of the Okanagan College Education Council will be conducted.

### 2. Scope and Application

This procedure applies to the annual elections or by-elections of the Chair and Vice Chair positions on Okanagan College Education Council. The election process is governed by the Council Bylaws and in the absence of a rule or procedure, the process defers to Robert's Rules of Order (Parliamentary Procedure).

### 3. Procedures for Chair and Vice Chair Elections

#### **Responsibility**

- 3.1 The Registrar or their designate is responsible for conducting the Chair and Vice Chair elections for Education Council.

#### **Elections**

- 3.2 Elections will normally be conducted annually at a Regular Open Meeting of the Council, normally by May each year.
- 3.3 Where there is a vacancy for the position of Chair or Vice Chair, a byelection to fill that vacancy will be held during the next Regular Open Meeting of the Council.

***Eligibility to Serve as Chair or Vice Chair***

3.4 Voting Employee Members are eligible to serve as Chair or Vice Chair.

***Nomination Process***

3.5 Any Council Member may make a nomination for Chair or Vice Chair.

3.6 Any nomination requires a mover and does not require a seconder.

3.7 Nominations for the position of Chair will be called for by the Registrar. The Registrar continues such calls until three successive calls produce no further nominations. At that point, the Registrar declares the call for nominations closed.

3.8 The Registrar asks the nominee(s) if they are prepared to stand and accepts nominations only where the reply is affirmative.

3.9 If only one candidate is nominated and that nominee is willing to serve, then that nominee will be elected without conducting a vote.

3.10 Following election by acclamation or the Voting Process, the Nomination and Voting Processes are repeated for the position of Vice Chair.

***Voting Process***

3.11 The Voting Process for elections will be conducted at the Regular Meeting of Council where the Nomination Process occurred.

3.12 Voting, if necessary, is by secret ballot at the Regular Meeting of Council where the nomination process occurred. Each Voting Member present is entitled to one vote for each position.

3.13 Ballots will be distributed by the Council Secretary. Where any member is participating in the vote electronically, all ballots will be distributed electronically.

3.14 The votes are tallied by the Registrar.

3.15 The election of the Chair or Vice Chair requires the affirmative votes of a majority of Voting Members present at a meeting in which a quorum is present.

3.16 If no candidate obtains the necessary majority on the first ballot, a second ballot election will be held between the two candidates with the highest number of votes.

3.17 In the event of a tie vote, the tie will be broken by drawing lots.

***Election Results***

3.18 The Registrar will announce the election results. The total number of votes received by each candidate are not announced.

3.19 Following the elections, the Registrar or their designate will notify the Council that the ballots will be destroyed.

- Integrated Curriculum Proposals Review Committee (ICPR)
- Operations Committee

The committee structure and Terms of Reference support both the Bylaws and Education Council Terms of Reference in ensuring that the Council can exercise its authority to carry out their governance responsibilities under the Act and the delegation of some of that work to its committees.

Members also reviewed and provided feedback on the Provisional Approval Committee Terms of Reference at the February 2025 meeting. Members suggested that clear criteria for when the committee can be used should be developed prior to implementation. From the members' recommendations the Criteria for Appearing Before the Provisional Approval Committee supporting document was developed. Both this document and the Terms of Reference are being presented at the May 1, 2025 Education Council meeting for the Council's consideration.

Since those meetings, J. Garrett consulted with the Education Council Chair at North Island College. The Chair reported that they established a Fast Track Committee under their Bylaws and have made use of the Committee to address items that timelines don't allow for normal timelines. They were interested to hear about the documents we are in the process of creating and as they establish guidelines.

### Recommendation:

The Education Council Chair is requesting Council's feedback on the Provisional Approval Committee Terms of Reference with the understanding that the Criteria for Appearing Before the Provisional Approval Committee document will be applied to each proposal to ensure the Council is effectively carrying out its governance responsibilities. Provided the Council supports this document in principle, the criteria would be applied to each proposal before a Provisional Approval Committee is established.

Should Council members support the Terms of Reference as presented, or with non-substantive changes, a motion for approval may be made at the May meeting. Pending substantive feedback, the revised document(s) would be presented at the June 5, 2025 Education Council meeting for review.

Subject to approval of the Provisional Approval Committee's Terms of Reference, this would be included in the updated Committee structure with planned implementation through summer 2025. It is recommended that the Council also assess the structure and effectiveness of this Committee after one year to ensure it is meeting the needs of the Council.

### **Rationale:**

The Provisional Approval Committee Council Terms of Reference serve in concert with the approved Education Council Terms of Reference, Education Council's sub-committees Terms of References, and recently updated Bylaws to define the Committee's governance responsibilities on behalf of the Council. The Terms of Reference were revised based on Council's feedback in addition to the principles presented in February and March 2025 meetings including aligning with best practices, providing clear direction regarding governance responsibilities, ensuring that the roles and duties for effective operations, and that the structure appropriately reflects the Council's membership and the authority of the Act.

The goal of the Provisional Approval Committee is to provide a one-time-only review of curriculum when timelines of the normal approval process cannot be met for extenuating circumstances. Proposals qualifying for approval by this committee are outlined in the new Criteria for Appearing Before the Provisional Approval Committee document. Proposers will be required to provide a rationale to request a review through the Provisional Approval Committee, fulfilling requirements outlined in the criteria document. The Provisional Approval Committee will not be a standing committee and would only be utilized on the rare occasion where convening the entire Council is impractical, with the Education Council Chair in consultation with the Operations Committee determining when this process is appropriate. It is important to note that Provisional Approval is intended as an exceptional procedure and not standard practice. As such, proposers will be required to have made their submissions to the Quali workflow, and careful consideration will be given to assess the urgency and impact of delaying a proposal to the next regular Council meeting. All approvals granted through the provisional process will be documented and reported on the consent agenda at the next Education Council meeting, ensuring transparency and proper record-keeping. This allows subsequent approvals related to the proposal to follow the normal procedures.

# Terms of Reference

## Provisional Approval Committee

### Purpose

The purpose of the Provisional Approval Committee is to provide a quick and nimble **one-time-only** approval of curriculum or transfer agreements when the timelines of the normal approval process cannot be met. This ensures that changes to or the development of curriculum or transfer agreements can be addressed promptly while maintaining the integrity and quality of the educational offerings.

### Membership

The Committee shall have a minimum of seven (7) voting members appointed by the Council Chair of which no less than fifty percent<sup>1</sup> are faculty or instructional employees:

Standing members:

- Chair, Integrated Curriculum Proposal Review Committee (ex officio)
- Chair, Education Council (ex officio)
- Provost & Vice President (ex officio)

Members appointed as needed:

- Minimum of two (2) to a maximum of five (5) Faculty/Instructor members selected from elected Faculty/Instructor members on the Council.<sup>1</sup>
- One (1) member from the appointed Educational Administrator members on the Council.
- One (1) member selected from either the elected Students on Council or the Support Staff on Council.

The Committee shall also include the following non-voting member of the Council:

- Registrar (ex officio)

The Chair of the Committee will be the Council Chair and is delegated the authority to appoint members to this Committee. Faculty, Educational Administrator, and Student or Support members will be appointed to the Committee on a case-by-case basis depending on the subject matter of the proposals requiring the Committees' review.

### Designated Resource Persons

The Committee is supported by:

- Governance Administrator

The Council Chair may request the President to appoint other relevant employees as designated resource persons in support of the Committee.

### Meetings

The Committee meets only as necessary as directed by the Operations Committee. Meetings shall be called with a minimum of five (5) calendar days' notice.

### Voting at Committee Meetings

Each voting member of the Committee has one vote on the Committee.

<sup>1</sup> The number will be dependent on whether the Chair of Education Council and the Integrated Curriculum Proposal Review Committee are members of faculty.

## Duties and Responsibilities

Subject to the powers and duties of the Council established in the College and Institute Act, and following an assessment of a proposals' rationale by the Operations Committee, the Committee will perform the following on matters submitted for expedited provisional approval:

- Review and evaluate proposals to ensure they meet established educational policies and standards.
- Review and evaluate proposals for new certificates, diplomas, and degrees.
- Review and evaluate proposals as necessary to meet required timelines for transfer agreements, accreditation, or one-time funding.
- Ensure proposals are consistent with institutional priorities.

This Committee is delegated the authority to recommend matters for approval directly to the Board of Governors on the condition that the curriculum or agreement be approved through regular Education Council procedures before accepting students for the next intake.

## Accountability

The Committee shall report its discussion and decisions to the Council by maintaining minutes of its meetings and providing a report at the next meeting of the Council.

## Review

The Terms of Reference for this Committee will be reviewed by the Committee at least once every three years and changes will be forwarded to the Council for approval.

**Criteria for Appearing Before the Provisional Approval Committee:**

The purpose of the Provisional Approval Committee is to provide a quick and nimble one-time-only approval of curriculum or agreements when the timelines of the normal approval process cannot be met. The following must be submitted by the Dean to the Governance Administrator. The information will be provided to the Chair, Education Council to determine if the proposal qualifies for this process.

To be considered, proposers must provide a written rationale (500 words or less) that addresses the following criteria:

**1. Urgency of Proposal:**

- The rationale must demonstrate a clear need for expedited approval due to time-sensitive factors that cannot be accommodated by the normal approval process.

**2. Impact Assessment:**

- The proposal must include an assessment of its potential impact on students, faculty/instructors, and the institution if the expedited process isn't followed.

**3. Alignment with Educational Policies:**

- The rationale must outline how the proposal adheres to established educational policies and standards confirming that it maintains the integrity and quality of the College's educational offerings.

**4. Consistency with Institutional Priorities:**

- The rationale should outline how the proposal aligns with the Inspire Plan, reflecting its commitment to academic excellence and innovation.

Along with the rationale:

- 1) The course and program material should be submitted and workflow completed (up to Education Council approval) using the normal Quali form.
- 2) Agreement routing should be completed in Etrieve up to the Governance Office.

### Background Statement:

This is a proposed agreement between Okanagan College and Vancouver Community College (VCC) for students in their diploma in accounting and diploma in technical marketing programs to transfer into the Okanagan College Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) program with 60 credits into third year standing. Each individual course included within this agreement was reviewed by a faculty subject matter expert for equivalency and appropriateness for the BBA program.

### Recommendation:

Seeking approval from Education Council to move forward with this agreement.

### Rationale:

By establishing this block transfer agreement, OC can attract a steady stream of well-prepared students from VCC. This reliable pipeline of transfer students supports sustainable enrollment targets and contributes to the growth of OC's BBA program.

The well-defined transfer structure provides clarity and confidence for both institutions and students. VCC students can plan their academic journey knowing they will receive full recognition for their diploma coursework. OC, in turn, can ensure that admitted transfer students possess the foundational knowledge needed for success in upper-year BBA courses.

A formalized articulation agreement with VCC fosters stronger collaborative ties between the two colleges. These partnerships can lead to further joint initiatives, enhanced curriculum development, and the sharing of best practices, ultimately benefiting faculty, staff, and students at both institutions.

**MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING  
OKANAGAN SCHOOL OF BUSINESS**

**THIS AGREEMENT** is made as of April 1, 2025

**MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING between Okanagan College and Vancouver Community College regarding block transfer credit.**

This Memorandum of Understanding constitutes an agreement between Okanagan College and the Vancouver Community College. The participating units at the respective institutions are the Okanagan School of Business at Okanagan College and the School of Hospitality, Food Studies & Business at the Vancouver Community College.

**Agreement Objective**

Okanagan College (OC) agrees to facilitate the block transfer of credits for students with appropriate prerequisite qualifications from Vancouver Community College (VCC) into the 120-credit (40 courses) Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) degree program at OC.

By this agreement, applicants from VCC who meet the requirements outlined below will be eligible for admission to OC with a block transfer into the 3<sup>rd</sup> year of the BBA degree program.

**Requirements**

Successful completion of one of the following two-year VCC diplomas:

- Marketing Technology Diploma
- Accounting Diploma

**Vancouver Community College agrees to:**

- make information about this agreement and the OC BBA degree option available to students.
- provide the opportunity for representatives of OC to visit appropriate forums at VCC to disseminate information about the OC BBA degree program.
- provide OC with updated information about the VCC diploma programs when changes occur.
- notify OC, with as much lead time as possible, about any changes to the VCC diploma program requirements that are anticipated or approved.

**Okanagan College agrees:**

- that applicants from VCC who meet the requirements outlined above will be eligible for admission to OC with block transfer credit into the 3<sup>rd</sup> year of the BBA degree program.
- to grant all applicants from VCC who meet the requirements outlined above transfer credits into the OC BBA as set out in Appendices A and B to this agreement.
- whenever possible, count any undefined transfer credits towards the BBA degree program requirements to avoid students from having to unnecessarily take courses to qualify for graduation.
- to provide VCC with updated information about the OC BBA degree program when changes occur.



- to notify VCC, with as much lead time as possible, about any changes to the BBA degree program that are anticipated or approved.

#### Other Aspects of this Agreement

This block transfer agreement will be promoted by both OC and VCC and communicated to current and prospective students of both institutions, and to business and industry partners. Promotion will include, but not be limited to, publication in each institution's promotional and communication materials, use of logos, and direct linkages between institutional websites. Consent will be obtained before using the other party's logo or trademarks.

While transfer students from VCC will be eligible for both the OC academic exchange programs and the dual degrees offered by OC and their partners throughout the world, transfer students will not be eligible to take part in those programs until they have completed 9 credits at OC. This restriction can be waived by the Dean of the School of Business at OC on an individual basis.

#### Liaison

Implementation of this agreement will be through the Registrar's Office at each institution, in consultation with the appropriate authorities in the respective business programs.

#### Terms of the Agreement

This agreement shall be in place for an initial period of three years commencing April 1, 2025. At the end of this time, the agreement may be extended for an additional period subject to review and approval by OC and/or VCC. Either party may terminate this Memorandum of Understanding upon 90 days advance notice in writing.

OC in its sole discretion retains the right to limit the number of students admitted under this agreement.

### Proposal Summary

### Background Statement:

In its advisory role to the Board, Education Council and its sub-committee Academic Regulations and Policies Committee (ARP) are asked to provide advice on the Final Assessment Policy to replace the Final Exam Policy in relation to the Academic Year Policy. The Final Assessment Policy is a policy approved by Education Council and the Academic Year Policy was approved by the Board at the March 11, 2025 meeting as recommended by Education Council.

A review of the Academic Year Policy and how it worked with the Final Examination Policy was conducted at an ARP Committee meeting on November 4, 2024. From the Committee's recommendations, updates were made to the Final Assessment Policy (previously the Final Examination Policy) to include more inclusive definitions of final assessments. The committee continued their review of the Final Assessment Policy at the November 18, 2024 and December 2, 2024 meetings.

At the February 3, 2025 ARP meeting the committee reviewed recommendations for the percentages outlined in section 8, End of Term Course Evaluation. The Education Council Chair asked Paul Martin, Dean, Teaching and Learning Innovations to conduct research regarding percentages for section 8 pertaining to the percentages of assessments scheduled by instructors during the last five teaching days of the semester/term and the percentages of assessments during the final assessment period. Paul Martin's proposed changes to the Final Assessment Policy are grounded in evidence-informed practice and mirror similar policies across the post-secondary sector. At the April 14, 2025 ARP meeting members supported Paul Martin's findings are recommended the approval of the Final Assessment Policy to Education Council.

### Recommendation:

To receive advice from Education Council members on the proposed Final Assessment Policy to replace the Final Examination Policy.

The Registrar is requesting that members provide feedback on the Final Assessment Policy. Should Council members support the Final Assessment Policy as drafted or with non-substantive changes, a motion for approval may be made at the May meeting. Pending more substantive feedback, the document will be presented at the June 5, 2025 Council meeting for final review and approval.

## Rationale:

The new Final Assessment Policy includes provisions for types of assessments more than written exams for inclusion in the scheduled assessment period (previously the examination period) with the intention of distributing the workload of students and instructors during the assessment period scheduled by the Registrar. Final Assessments have been included to clarify what types of evaluations occur during the final assessment period scheduled by the Registrar.

### **Paul Martin, Dean of Teaching & Learning's Research**

Following a review of similar policies at 14 different colleges and universities across Canada along with scholarship on assessment, feedback, and academic integrity, it is recommended that Education Council approve the proposed changes to the Final Assessment Policy, including those proposing limits to the percentage of assessments that can occur within the last five teaching days of the semester prior to a final assessment.

Academic policies on assessment and student learning typically include stipulations that clarify expectations for both students and instructors as to the timing and weighting of final assessments of learning. Based upon a review of similar policies at 14 colleges and universities in Canada the following types of regulations are present across the sector.

#### 1) Required breaks between the submission of assessments at the end of the semester and the date of the final exam.

Every one of the institutional academic policies reviewed had a clear policy as to the timing of submission (and return) of end-of-term coursework prior to the final exam.

Douglas College's policy states that "In the interest of planned student learning, no evaluations can be conducted in class that, individually or in combination, are worth more than 10% of the final course grade during the final 14 calendar days of classes (this 14-day period will be pro-rated for courses shorter or longer than a regular semester length)." Thompson Rivers University states that "In the last week of instruction, no on-campus course may include an examination which makes up more than fifteen percent (15%) of the student's final grade, with the exception of laboratory and Law examinations." The University of Calgary has a nearly identical policy to TRU except that their timeline is two weeks rather than one.

The rationale for these policies is twofold: first, they help students to plan ahead and to ensure that they have ample time to prepare for their final exams, which are often more heavily weighted than other assignments in their course. Second, they also help faculty to ensure that they have ample time to grade any assignments or tests prior to when students take their final exams. This timing is crucial for student learning and feedback as it allows the student the opportunity to learn from the assessment of all submitted work prior to the completion of the final assessment.

After discussion at the April 14, 2025 ARP meeting members suggested that a test, exam, and assessment should not exceed the same percentage during the last week of class to ensure all assessments are weighed equally. Paul Martin agreed to the change and recommended 15% percent for all assessments.

**Recommendation: That Okanagan College include in its policy a clause that states that in the last week of class instructors may not require students to complete a test, exam, or assessment worth more than 15% of the student's final grade.**

## 2) Maximum weighting of final assessments

While the minimum and maximum weighting for final exams can vary somewhat across institutions, all of the policies consulted have clear guidelines as to how much work must be complete before the writing of final exams.

Some policies state that no assignment (final exam or otherwise) should account for more than 30–50% of a final grade. Others simply state that no final exam can be worth more than 50% of the final mark.

As scholars such as James Lang (2013) and Sarah Eaton have noted, the use of high stakes assessments such as heavily-weighted final assessments can also lead to increased academic integrity issues and have an impact on student mental health and academic performance.

**Recommendation: That Okanagan College stipulate that no assessment should be worth more than 40% of the final grade, unless it is for courses or industries that may require students to demonstrate their learning through a more heavily weighted final assessment.**

### 1. Policy Statement

Student learning is evaluated through different approaches and the College acknowledges that Final Assessments are one of the many ways in which Students can demonstrate their learning.

A Final Assessment is a summative evaluation used to measure a learner's overall understanding, skills, or competencies at the end of a course. Final Assessments can take many forms, including but not limited to written Final Examinations, Final Papers/Projects/Portfolios, and Final Presentations/Practical Assessments (hands-on or lab-based evaluations), or a combination of these methods.

The results of a Final Assessment often contribute significantly to the student's final grade or academic standing. A Final Assessment is scheduled by the Registrar during the Final Assessment Period.

### 2. Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to provide direction to departments, instructors, and Students on the rights and responsibilities with respect to Final Assessments and conditions around rescheduling Final Assessments.

### 3. Scope and Application

This policy applies to all College courses in which there are Final Assessments at the end of the course, and where those Final Assessments are scheduled by the Registrar during the Final Assessment Time Period.

This policy also applies when determining the total value of end of term evaluations that contribute to the Student's final grade including term assignments, presentations, group projects, or any other form of evaluation scheduled in the five teaching days prior to the Final Assessment Time Period.

This policy does not apply to examinations that are administered by authorized professional governing bodies, trade licensure bodies, or industry training authorities.

### 4. Definitions

<b>Examination Reschedule</b>	Means granting a Student, under exceptional circumstances, to write their Final Examination at a date or time other than the scheduled date and time of the examination.
<b>Exceptional Circumstances</b>	Means instances that are beyond a Student's control and may negatively impact a Student's academic performance.
<b>Final Assessment</b>	Means an assessment of Student learning that is formally scheduled during the Final Assessment Time Period by the Registrar (see also 1. Policy Statement).
<b>Final Assessment Schedule</b>	Means a schedule listing all Final Assessments, their date, time, duration, designated location, and assigned invigilators.
<b>Final Assessment Time Period</b>	Means the period during which Final Assessments are scheduled.
<b>Final Examination</b>	Means a written exam scheduled within the Final Assessment Time Period.
<b>Final Grade Appeal</b>	Means a request for a Final Grade to be reviewed or changed based on the presence of grounds for appeal and evidence supplied by the student to support their case.
<b>Final Paper/Project/Portfolio</b>	Means a body of work that is scheduled to be due during the Final Assessment Time Period. Often students can submit their work early.
<b>Final Presentation/Practical Assessment</b>	Means a group or individual presentation or practical assessment (hands-on or lab-based evaluations) scheduled during the Final Assessment Time Period.
<b>Instructor</b>	Means College professor, vocational instructor, or continuing education instructor.
<b>Student</b>	Means any person enrolled as a student at Okanagan College. For the purpose of this policy means a Student who is on the official class list.
<b>Support Person</b>	Means someone who can assist a Student in understanding the College's policies and procedures and help a Student identify questions that they may have throughout institutional processes.

Examples include Student Services employees, Student Association representative, elder, friend.

## 5. Principles

- 5.1 The Final Assessment Time Period is published annually by the Registrar's Office and found at [www.okanagan.bc.ca/dates](http://www.okanagan.bc.ca/dates).
- 5.2 Any Final Assessment scheduled during the Final Assessment Time Period, must be scheduled by the Registrar.
- 5.3 The Registrar is responsible to prepare the Final Assessment Schedule with the primary goal of ensuring the minimum number of schedule conflicts for Students.
- 5.4 Students are required to write or complete Final Examinations or Final Presentations/Practical Assessments at the time, date, and designated examination location indicated on the Final Assessment Schedule. Students should be aware that these may be scheduled on days and times that differ from regular class schedules, including evenings and weekends.
- 5.5 Subject to an Instructor's discretion and specific exam protocols, students are expected to begin the Final Examinations on time and latecomers will not be admitted after thirty (30) minutes. Students who arrive late for a Final Examination are not allowed additional time. Students may not leave the Final Examination setting within the first 30 minutes or the final thirty (30) minutes of the examination period.
- 5.6 Student requirements for Final Presentations/Practical Assessments are outlined by the Instructor and/or their department.
- 5.7 Final Papers/Projects/Portfolios that are scheduled by the Registrar during the Final Assessment Time Period, can generally be submitted earlier by Students to their Instructors up to the scheduled date and time.

## 6. Rescheduling

In the event of an Exceptional Circumstance that meets the criteria outlined below, Students may apply to write or complete a Final Examination or Final Presentation/Practical Assessment at a time other than the scheduled time using the [Request For Out-Of-Time Assessment form](#). For Final Papers/Projects/Portfolios, Students must speak with their Instructor directly. Requests must be received in advance of the assessment.

### **Criteria:**

- 6.1 Assessments Schedule Conflict:
  - a) two or more Final Assessments scheduled at the same time;
  - b) three or more Final Assessments scheduled within a 24-hour period; or
  - c) insufficient time to travel between campuses for the purpose of writing or completing Final Examinations or Presentations/Practical Assessments.
- 6.2 Unforeseen Circumstances:
  - a) Medical/Health: Student has been injured, or hospitalized or is under the care of a health or care professional/practitioner for a condition which prevents the Student from writing or completing Final Examinations or Presentations/Practical Assessments at the scheduled time.

- b) Compassionate Reasons: a death, serious illness or injury of a member of the Student's immediate family, or other emergency situations.
  - c) Legal Obligations which include but are not restricted to jury duty or court appearances.
- 6.3 The Final Assessment Schedule conflicts with a recognized religion and spiritual days practiced by the Student.
- 6.4 The Final Assessment Schedule conflicts with Student participation in competitions (International, National, Provincial level), College-approved student competitions/events, and/or extraordinary employment opportunity (i.e confirmation of a job overseas).
- 6.5 At the discretion of the Program Dean/Director, or designate, consideration or alternative arrangements may also be given for other unforeseen events beyond the Student's control.

## 7. Assessment Papers and Documentation

- 7.1 Final Assessment papers and documentation including Instructor notes will be destroyed after a period of no less than one year.
- 7.2 In the event of a Final Grade Appeal, all Final Assessment papers and documentation will be retained by the College for twelve (12) months beyond the resolution of the appeal and will be destroyed after such date.

## 8. End of Term Course Evaluation

- 8.1 The College recognizes that the results of Final Assessments may contribute significantly to a Student's final grade and academic standing. Therefore, Students shall not be required to complete any other test exam, or other assessment which contributes more than fifteen percent (15%) toward the final grade in a course during the last five teaching days of the semester/term as outlined in the Academic Year schedule created by the Registrar based on the *Academic Year Policy*.
- 8.2 No assessments shall have an assigned due date in the period between the end of the semester/term and the beginning of Final Assessment Time Period.
- 8.3 Cumulatively, any combination of assessments during the last five teaching days of the semester/term and during the exam period, cannot exceed forty percent (40%) of the final grade, unless it is for courses or industries that may require students to demonstrate their learning through a more heavily weighted final assessment.
- 8.4 Section 8.1 does not apply to laboratory examination or field courses and other courses whose schedules do not match that of the regular timetable, whether summer session or regular term.
- 8.5 Section 8.1. does not apply ongoing participation marks and self-assessments completed by the students.

### Background Statement:

At the January 9, 2025 Education Council meeting members approved the revised Education Council Bylaws that state Education Council will establish the date, time, and location of Regular Meetings by resolution. Education Council also approved the terms of reference for the Integrated Curriculum Proposal Review Committee (ICPR) and the Academic Governance Committee (AGC) at the March 6, 2025 Education Council meeting.

The Education Council Chair is proposing the September 2025 to December 2026 meeting schedule, with meetings scheduled for Thursdays at 3:00p.m. to provide consistent dates and timing. The ICPR meetings are proposed for the first Thursday of the month, followed by the AGC and Education Council meetings on the second and third Thursdays of the month, respectively.

### Recommendation:

The Education Council Chair is requesting that members provide feedback on the Education Council meeting schedule from September 2025 to December 2026. Should Council members support the meeting schedule as drafted or with non-substantive changes, a motion for approval may be made at the May meeting. Pending more substantive feedback, the meeting schedule will be revised and presented at the June 5, 2025 Council meeting for final review and approval.

### Rationale:

The proposed meeting schedule for the Education Council and its sub-committees is structured to improve the efficiency of Council's operations and help members plan their schedules in advance.

The schedule allows for a two-week period between the ICPR and Education Council meetings to ensure that proposers have sufficient time to make any non-substantive revisions prior to issuing the agenda for that month's Education Council meeting. As Council work delegated to the AGC is generally less time-sensitive to implement than curriculum proposals, these meetings are scheduled one week prior to the Education Council meetings. This scheduling approach will allow for flexibility in prioritizing agenda items that move through each Committee to Education Council based on their urgency and importance.

The Education Council workplan is being developed and will align with the schedule. The schedule and workplan will include strategy and professional development sessions in September, December, and June. These sessions are intended to provide opportunities for members to engage in long-term strategic

planning and aligning the Council's activities with its strategic goals. Designating meetings for strategy and professional development topics will allow members to contribute more effectively, and to derive additional value from their roles on Education Council.
